

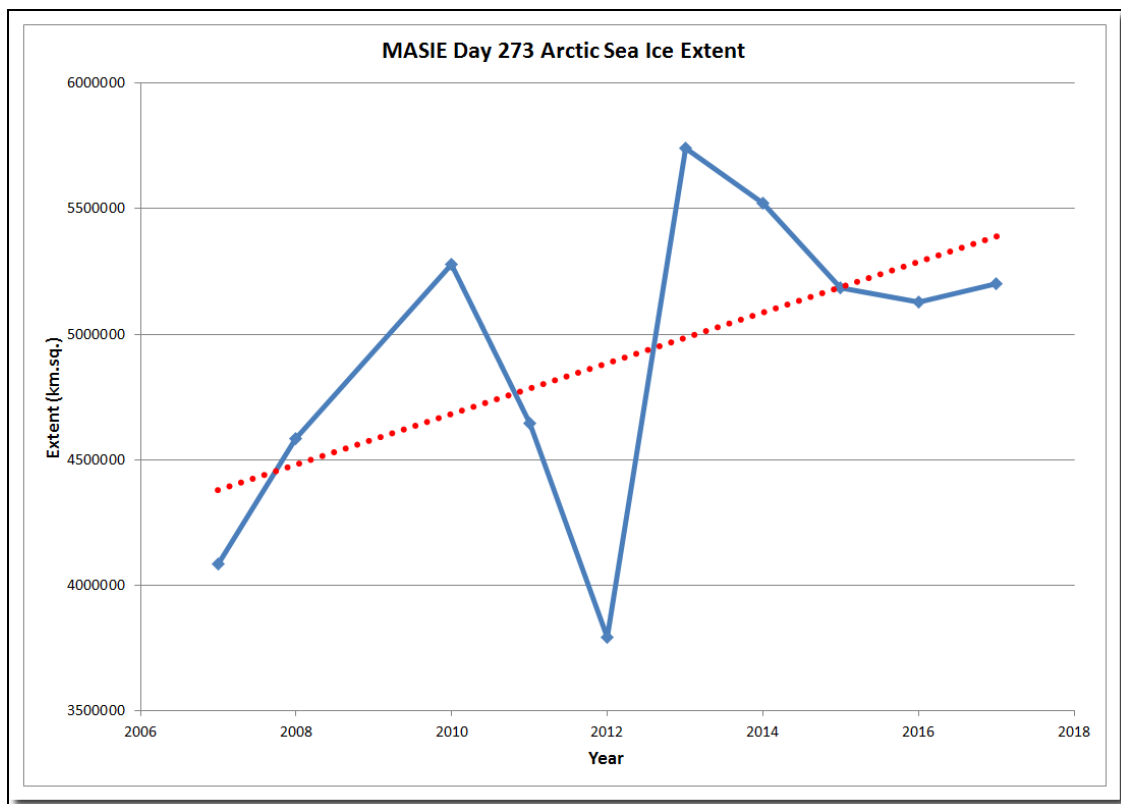

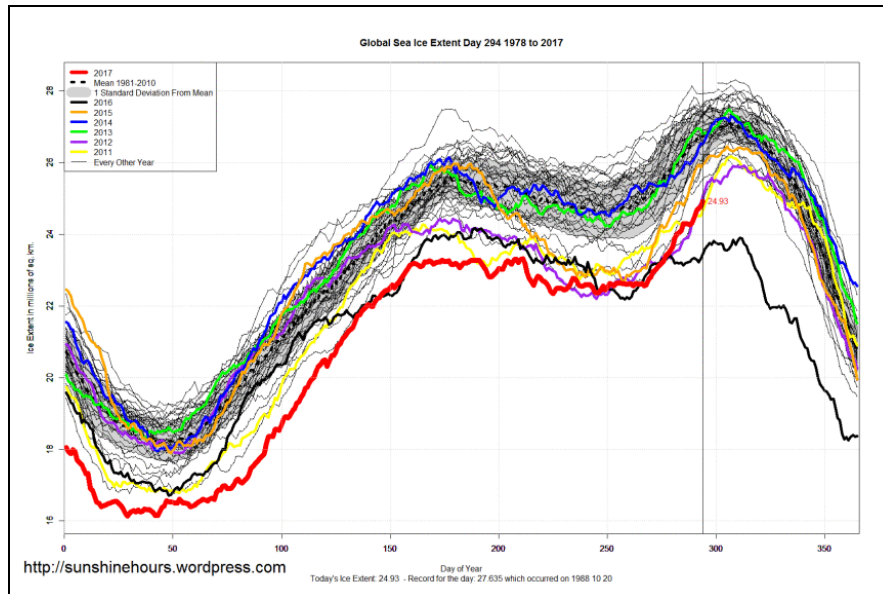
Minimum Ice Cover Arctic Summers

- Multi-year lows were set in 2007 and in 2012.
- The current trend is increasing to the normal low-side of the range.
- The climate promotion team has been in full voice for a long time.

The following chart provides another way of looking at it.



- 2016 – Black Line – El Nino Year.
- 2017 – Red Line – First Year After.
- Not yet an Al Nina.
- These can be considered as big weather events.

The seasonal low for Arctic Sea Ice has been set. And with the turn to expanding ice cover, Greenland’s numbers are tracking the high-side of the historical range.
